- Make arrangements to work together
- Publish those arrangements
- Act in accordance with the published arrangements for their area and resolve disputes
- Publish a report at least once every twelve months
- Arrange for Independent Scrutiny of the arrangements



- Evidence of impact of the work (including training) on outcomes for children and families
- Don't be afraid of acknowledging areas for improvement
- Not 'who did or didn't do what and when' but evidence, analysis and system improvement

CHALLENGES

- Time and priorities
- Thinking differently
- Statutory partners' different remits and resources
- Role of relevant agencies

OPPORTUNITES

- Using the experience of service users to shape thinking
- Relentless focus on the effect on front line practice creating a safer system
- Proactive use of analysis to horizon scan
- Reduction in bureaucracy
